

Press release "Pretty Good Films" Open Air Festival showcases the magic of cinema, Swiss style!

Beijing, September 26th - The Swiss Embassy today announced the launch of its annual showcase of the best in Swiss cinema. Under the embassy's yearly campaign of *Pretty Good Switzerland*, the event is titled *Pretty Good Films Open Air Film Festival* and is scheduled to take place from September 26th to 28th. More than 150 film enthusiasts, industry professionals, and media representatives attended the Grand Opening today, celebrating Swiss cinematic excellence while fostering bilateral cooperation and understanding through the art of film.

The 4th Swiss Film Festival features a carefully curated selection of films from prestigious film festivals in Switzerland. This year's lineup includes eight films, including four documentaries, two narrative features, and two animations, all showcasing the unique perspectives and talents of Swiss filmmakers. In addition to the traditional VIP and Public screenings, it also features academic and artistic screenings for economic and art professionals respectively, followed by Q&A and discussions.

Film festivals are deeply rooted in Swiss cultural traditions. The country has a multitude of film festivals, ranging from animated films and documentaries to auteur cinema and shorts. The most well-known festival is the Locarno International Film Festival founded in 1946. Among Europe's most prestigious festivals, it is dedicated to auteur films. The Zurich Film Festival, launched in 2005, also enjoys an international reputation and has already welcomed several Hollywood stars. Film lovers also make pilgrimages to Nyon for the Visions du Réel festival, to the Solothurn Film Festival, and Neuchâtel for its International Fantastic Film Festival.

"I am proud to promote the vibrant and diverse world of Swiss cinema. Our films embody the unique blend of creativity, innovation, and cultural heritage that defines our country, " Swiss Ambassador Jürg Burri said at the Grand Opening, "With the Economy under the spotlight this year, we will tell you through the lens of film that, how Switzerland, a mountainous country lacking natural resources becomes an economic major power."

Since 2021, the Swiss Film Festival has become a flagship project of the Swiss Embassy. The previous three editions were all well received by the Chinese audience, with themes on *Smart & Sustainable, Swissplained,* and *Diversity & Me.* The 4th edition is also part of the embassy's public diplomacy campaign 2024-2025, with a focus on the *Economy* in 2024 to celebrate the entry into

force of the Sino-Swiss Free Trade Agreement and will culminate in the 75th anniversary next year of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Switzerland and China.

The "*Pretty Good Films*" *Festival* will open to the public free of charge on September 27th and 28th at the Swiss embassy, with subsequent public screenings taking place in Hangzhou between October 3rd to 8th. Follow our social media for the full festival schedule and registration details.

No Dogs or Italians Friday, September 27 (Animation, 80')



Grounding Friday, September 27 (Fiction, 120')



The demise of airline Swissair in 2001 was a huge blow to Switzerland's economy and the country's morale. It was a sad day in Swiss history when the airline's fleet was grounded on 2 October 2001. Grounding is set during the last days of the doomed airline, and tells the story of manager Mario A. Corti's unhappy fate, the last, unlucky CEO at the traditional airline company, as well as of all those nameless people who lost almost everything in the maelstrom of Swissair's downfall: their job, home and their belief in Switzerland.

The film about Max Bill (1908-1994) is a highly potent mix of arts, aesthetics, and politics. Max Bill was probably the most important Swiss artist of the 20th century. During his lifetime he was a rebel

- today he lives ever present in the upper spheres of the most influential artists of the 20th century. His name stands for an avant-garde, which is firmly focussed on the future, which bears a social responsibility, and which intrinsically contains an engaged political message. What mattered for Max Bill was the creation of our environment and a green consciousness, which is currently of incredible imminence.

Liberally inspired by a true story that took place in the Tessin at the beginning of the 2000s. Mario is an unemployed engineer, a victim of the economic crisis. He decides to organize the robbery of the century. The police had just stored in a military facility the largest quantity of cannabis ever seized in Switzerland, and it would be burned shortly. Mario decides to put together a gang to 'substitute' the cannabis with common hay without anybody being the wiser. All of them are convinced to have in their hands the "green gold" that will change definitively their lives. Instead...

Dragon Women Saturday, September 28 (Documentary, 82')



Often called Dragons, women in the finance sector still represent a small minority, especially in the higher spheres of power. Shot in Europe, America & Asia, this documentary is a series of intimate portraits of various senior women in the finance sector. Filmed at work, at home, and during their leisure time, they'll tell us what made them succeed in the business and share with us the mechanisms they've had to implement to survive in one of the most competitive and masculine sectors in the world.
